

Lenox William McClure John was the son of General Thomas John and his wife Edith Maria John. On the 1911 Census he was living with his father in law, the Revd. Alfred Gray in Basingstoke.

When war was declared Lenox was living in British Columbia; he returned home to enlist, firstly in a Public Schools Battalion of the Royal Fusiliers and later in the London Regiment.

In 1916 the Regiment was in action in the Battle of the Somme where Second Lieutenant Lenox John was injured and died of septic poisoning on the 24th September 1916. He was aged 34. He is buried in Heilly Station Cemetery, Mericourt l'Abbe in the Somme.

At the time of his death his wife was living in Wadhurst, Sussex and his widowed father in law at Weston House, Albury. He is remembered on our War Memorial and those of Partridge Green, West Grinstead and Kootenay Lake in British Columbia.

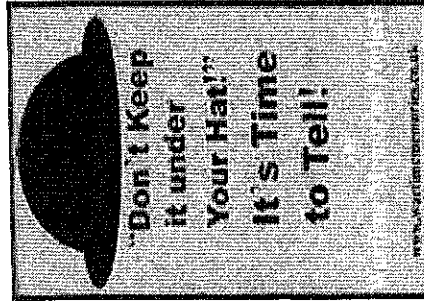
- 1st Battalion, Lincolnshire Regiment during the Great War -

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1st Battalion, Lincolnshire Regiment

1st Battalion, Lincolnshire Regiment were in Portsmouth at the outbreak of the Great War in August 1914 serving with 9th Brigade, 3rd Division. They proceeded to France with the BEF, landing at Le Havre on the 14th of August 1914. They saw action in The Battle of Mons and the rearguard action at Solesmes, The Battle of Le Cateau, The Battle of the Marne, The Battle of the Aisne, at La Basse, Messines and the First Battle of Ypres. On the 14th of November 1915 the 1st Lincolns transferred to 62nd Brigade, 21st Division, who had suffered heavy casualties at Loos. In 1916 They were in action in the Battles of The Somme, including The Battle of Morval in which the Division captured Geudecourt. In 1917 they were in action during The German retreat to the Hindenburg Line, the Arras offensive, the Third Battles of Ypres and The Cambrai Operations. In 1918 they fought on The Somme then moved north and were in action during the Battles of the Lys, the Battle of the Aisne, The Somme, the Battles of the Hindenburg Line and the Final Advance in Picardy. At the Armistice the Division were around Berlaimont, on the 12th they moved to Beaufort, then in mid December they moved west of Amiens and demobilisation began being completed by the 19th of May 1919.

West Grinstead is about five miles south of Horsham and the parish consists of the villages of West Grinstead, Partridge Green and the surrounding area. There are also War Memorials at Our Lady of Consolation and St Francis Roman Catholic Church, West Grinstead, St George's Church, West Grinstead and the 'Old Comrades' Memorial on the B2135 between West Grinstead and Partridge Green.

The church of St Michael and All Angels was built in the late 19th century following the building a the railway from Shoreham to the Christ's Hospital near Horsham. The railway station at Partridge Green enabled a small village to flourish several miles from the parish church of St George and it was decided to build a church there too.

There are three memorials to First World War casualties. Two are at Partridge Green and another at St George's. The one at St George's is a combined one for both churches. It also includes one extra name to that at St Michael's.

Above the combined list is the inscription:

'In Gratitude to the Men of the parish who died in the Great War 1914-1918'

Beneath the list is a further inscription:

'Their name liveth for evermore'

At Partridge Green is a Cross of Remembrance outside the church and a brass plaque inside. Both contain a list of names. The Cross contains the inscription:-

**'In Grateful Remembrance of the Partridge Green men
who died for their country in the Great War 1914-1918
Their name liveth for evermore'**

The plaque inside the church contains the following:-

**St Michael's Church Partridge Green
To the ever-sacred and glorious memory of the following
who have laid down their lives for God, King and Country.**

The number of casualties listed varies. The one at St George's has 27 names, the Cross at St Michael's has 26 and the plaque inside St Michael's only 25.

Husband of Mrs Muriel A John) later Gay) of Snape, Wadhurst, East Sussex. Died of wounds 24th September 1916. Buried in Grave IV F 25 in Heilly Station Cemetery, Mericourt-L'Abbe. Previously served in a 'Public Schools' battalion of the Royal Fusiliers, service number PS/3818

KENSETT

William Bernard

Trooper 2046, Household Battalion Born about 1916 in Partridge Green. Son of Mr & Mrs Philip Kensett of 'Oxford House', Partridge Green. Living in Partridge Green when he enlisted in Horsham. Killed in action 5th October 1917. Commemorated on Panel 3 of the Tyne Cot Memorial.

Also included on the Old Comrades Memorial, West Grinstead.

MILLHAM

Corporal 14270, 71st Brigade Royal Field Artillery. Born in Henfield. Son of Mr E & Mrs J Millham of 5, Minster Terrace, Partridge Green. Enlisted in Hayward's Heath. Killed in action 24th April 1917. Buried in Grave III A 19 in Feuchy Chapel British Cemetery, Wancourt. Served in 'D' Battery. Awarded the Military Medal for bravery.
