



Probably a late Open Hall house, say 1550, of two-bayed open hall with service room and solar over at the East end. With added bays each end, added chimney, and additions to the South, possibly when it became a great house and nursing home, c. 1926. The original Stockhouse Farmhouse.

A massive and lofty house, like Middle Farm. Dowel posts, arching braces, two vertical Queen posts. Curved wind braces. Diminishing principal rafters. Roof rebuilt with some black rafters. Ridge board running between principal rafters, which are pegged.

Diamond mullioned window with shutter in solar. W. end of roof = gabled, E. end half hipped. No sign of rooled gable or smoke hood or smoke bay. Probably well from Open Hall direct to chimney house. Large chimney with small bricked, 18th cent, seats, oak hole & possible tiled oven. Room for bacon loft over.

Floor joists have run over stops, beams, stepped stops. Hearth beam runs from wall to wall so could have formed part of a smoke hood, but no sign of one.

Added partition probably moved from bay post ^{from} where the first floor partition was.

"Stocklands, Storkland, Stalkland" a copyhold tenement in Elizabeth I's time, with 30 acres. In 1839 the Title Map shows house with (possibly) a barn, which could be Farley End, to which Farley House is now attached.

Middle Farm, Farley Green

Large 2-bay open hall house, with cross passage, service bay and outshot beyond; possibly contemporary. Modern bay added to East.
