



A late barn, in traditional style, c. 1900, of three bays, with cart doors both sides, timber framed end weatherboarded and corrugated iron roof. Gabled.

Set on a stone sill with some ironstone and brick quoins. Frame is of sawn timbers with tie beams, straight braces and diagonal braces in the walls.

Roof of light timbers, widely spaced, and very shallow pitch, probably designed for corrugated iron.

There is a pitching door high in south wall, but no loft. Central threshing floor of concrete. Floors in end bays could not be seen, but probably concrete also.

Probably one of the last barns to be built of tradition.
