**ALBURY** (or Aldbury) is a parish and village situated in a vale at the foot of a range of chalk hills, extending from near Farnham into Kent, and on the Tillingbourne, which flows through the parish, and is 1½ miles north-east from Chilworth station on the South Eastern and Chatham railway, 5 east of Guildford and 36 from London, in the South Western division of the county, Blackheath hundred, second division, Guildford petty sessional division and union, Guildford and Godalming county court district, rural deanery of Guildford, archdeaconry of Surrey and diocese of Winchester. The village originally surrounded the old church, the village green adjoining the churchyard, but the houses have in course of time entirely disappeared, and what is now known as Albury formerly constituted the hamlet of Weston Street. The church of SS. Peter and Paul, erected in 1842, at the expense of the late Henry Drummond esq. M.P. of Albury Park, and restored and a chancel added by his son-in-law, the late Duke of Northumberland K.G. is of brick in the Romanesque style, and has a tower containing a clock and six bells; all the windows are filled with stained glass; and there are 350 sittings, half being free. The ruins of the ancient church, a good specimen of Norman work, stand in the park. The register dates from the year 1559. The living is a rectory, net yearly value £400, with 10 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of the Duke of Northumberland K.G., P.C. and held since 1904 by the Rev. Henry Ernest Crowley M.A. of Hertford College, Oxford, who is also incumbent of Chilworth, or St. Martha-on-the-Hill. The Catholic Apostolic church is a cruciform building in the Decorated style, erected mainly at the expense of the late Henry Drummond esq. M.P. with a western tower and shallow transepts; the interior transepts are faced with open screen work: on the north side is a small octagonal chapter house. The old school has been converted into a hall, and is used for parish purposes &c. The charities, including the old Duncombe land trust, which has now been realized and invested in Consols, amount in all to about £200 yearly. Here on a plain, at a short distance from the road to Cranleigh, are the foundations of a building conjectured to have been a Roman temple. Albury Park is the seat of the Duke of Northumberland K.G., V.D., P.C. lord of the manor and the principal landowner: the mansion, rebuilt by the

late Henry Drummond esq. M.P. stands in a park of about 120 acres: the garden has a fine terrace, a quarter of a mile in length, and contains a great variety of hardy trees and shrubs: the picture gallery includes many good copies of the old Italian masters, from originals in the public collections of Italy. Alderbrook is the residence of Pandeli Ralli esq. D.L., J.P. The soil is of a light sandy nature; subsoil, gravel and chalk. The chief crops are wheat, barley and oats. The area is 4,405 acres of land and 14 of water; rateable value, £7,468; the population in 1911 was 1,182 in the civil and 1,354 in the ecclesiastical parish, which comprises parts of Albury, Alfold and Chilworth.

Under the provisions of the Divided Parishes Act, 1882, parts of Cranley, Shere and Wonsersh have been added to Albury, and a part of Albury transferred to Alfold.

BROOK and Farley Heath, to the south, are in this parish. Here many Roman remains have been discovered at various times, including upwards of 1,000 coins of the Cæsars, and examples of ancient British money, fibule, weapons, pottery &c.

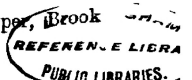

**ALFOLD** (or Aldfold) is a parish and village, near Sussex, 4 miles west from the Baynards station on the London, Brighton and South Coast railway, 9 south-east from Godalming and 1 east from the Surrey and Sussex canal, in the South Western division of the county, hundred of Blackheath, Guildford and Godalming county court district, Guildford petty sessional division, Hambledon union, rural deanery of Godalming, archdeaconry of Surrey and diocese of Winchester. The church of St. Nicholas is an edifice of stone in the Early English style, and has a tower with spire, containing 3 bells: there is a monument to Francis Dorrington, dated 1693: an oak chest dated 1687, and a stained east window: the church affords 200 sittings. The register of baptisms and burials dates from the year 1658, marriages from 1659. The living is a rectory, net income £243, with residence and 17 acres of glebe, in the gift of the Church Pastoral Aid Society, and held since 1906 by the Rev. Francis Stewart Legg M.A. of Emmanuel College, Cambridge. The Wesleyan (formerly Baptist) chapel here was erected in 1883, and has 270 sittings. A cemetery of half an acre was formed in 1880, at a cost of £71; it is under the control of the Parish Council. Sachel Court is the residence of Thomas Wharrie esq. J.P. The Earl of Onslow P.C., G.C.M.G. is lord of the manor of Alfold and Joseph E. Sparkes esq. and Henry Mellersh esq. are joint lords of the manor of Sedgheurst. The principal landowner is Thomas Wharrie esq. J.P. The soil is heavy; subsoil,

clay. The chief crops are wheat, beans, barley, oats, turnips and mangolds. The area is 2,974 acres of land and 12 of water; rateable value, £2,569; the population in 1911 was 595 in the civil and 620 in the ecclesiastical parish, which comprises parts of Alfold and Wisborough Green.

By Local Government Board Order, 16,533, dated March 24, 1884, that part of the parish in Sussex was transferred to Wisborough Green, and by Order 10,920, dated December 2, 1880, a detached part of Albury was added to Alfold.

**ANERLEY** is a suburb of London, and forms part of the Urban District of Penge and was, by the "London Govern-

ment Act, 1899," by Order in Council, 1900, transferred to Kent.

**ARTINGTON**, see Guildford.

**ASH** is an extensive parish on the borders of Hampshire, with two stations on the Farnham and Alton branch of the South Western railway and two on the Reading, Guildford and Reigate branch of the South Eastern and Chatham railway, 8 miles west from Guildford, 3½ north-east from Farnham, 2½ from Aldershot, 36 from London, in the North Western division of the county, first division of Woking hundred, Guildford petty sessional division, Farnham union and county court district, rural deanery of Guildford, archdeaconry of Surrey and diocese of Winchester. The church of St. Peter, originally Norman, is a building of flint, and has a tower with spire reaching a height of 100 feet and containing 5 bells: there are two brasses to the Manory family: the church was restored in 1865, at a cost of £3,000, and affords 300 sittings. The register dates from the year 1549. The living is a rectory, net yearly value £250, with residence and 5 acres of glebe, in the gift of Winchester College, and held since 1883 by the Rev. Albert Octavius Walsh M.A. of Queen's College, Oxford. There is a cemetery under the control of the Ash Burial Board. The church of St. Mary, ASH VALE, was built in 1906, at a cost of about £1,000, and will seat 250 persons: the Rev. Bennett G. L. Williams B.A. has been curate in charge since 1911. The old church is now used for meetings. There are Wesleyan and Primitive Methodist chapels in Ash Vale, and a Wesleyan chapel in Ash street. The Victoria Hall, erected in 1897 in commemoration of the Diamond Jubilee of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, will hold 250 persons and is let for meetings and entertainments. The charities amount to about £25 yearly. The Basingstoke canal runs through the parish. To the north are large commons and downs; to the south the chalk range. The manor of Ash belonged to the Abbey of Chertsey and came into the hands of Henry VIII. on the dissolution of that house: it was afterwards granted to the College of St. Mary at Winchester, to which it now belongs. The principal landowners are Winchester College and H. M. Chester esq. of Poyle Park. The soil is in some parts sandy, covered with heath, in others clay, and very fertile; subsoil, clay. The chief crops are wheat, barley and oats; there are some hops

and a good deal of pasture land. The parish contains 6,292 acres of land and 32 of water; rateable value, £26,209; the population in 1911 was—civil, 4,482; ecclesiastical, 3,531.

**WYKE**, now forming an ecclesiastical parish, was transferred from Worplesdon to Ash for civil purposes, by Local Government Board Order 10,925, dated Dec. 2, 1880.

**NORMANDY**, a hamlet and tithing of Ash, 2 miles east, is in Wyke ecclesiastical parish and Guildford postal district.
