ALBURY, or ALDBURY, in Blackheath Hundred, second division, 1 mile from Chilworth station, 36 from London; is a parish and village in Blackheath Hundred, second division, and Guildford Union, West Surrey. Here, on a plain, a short distance from the road to Cranley, is the foundation of what is generally considered to have been a Roman temple. The parish is situated in a vale at the foot of a range of chalk hills, which extend from near Farnham into Kent. The population of this parish was in 1851, 976, and the area in acres, 4,503. The principal landed proprietor is Henry Drummond, Esq. M.P. The living is a rectory, in the deanery of Stoke, valued at £429 per annum, in the patronage of Henry Drummond, Esq.

The rector is the Rev. John Hooper. Here is a National school for boys and girls. The old church, which is situate in his park, is out of repair, and no service is performed there. The new church is in the village, and has 6 bells; it was erected at the expense of H. Drummond, Esq. There is also a chapel on a large scale, and an octagon chapter-house in the park, for the use of those who have embraced the religious tenets of Mr. Irving. Lord Lovaine resides at Albury Park; Lord Sidmouth has a seat here, and there are many mansions and genteel residences. Lady Gifford has a seat called Weston House; Thomas Carlyle, Esq., and M. F. Tupper, Esq., are residents.
